At the conclusion of Matins, we sing the Great Doxology followed by the Matins Dismissal Troparion.

BLESSING OF THE PALMS

Troparion for Palm Sunday

O Christ God, when we were buried with Thee in Baptism, we became deserving of Thy Resurrection to Immortal Life. Wherefore we praise Thee, crying: Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the Name of the Lord.

FIRST ANTIPHON verses with refrain: (Psalm 114/115)

Vs. I am well content: for the Lord will hear the voice of my supplication.

Refrain: Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us.

- Vs. Tribulations and sorrow have I found; and I called on the name of the Lord. [Refrain]
- Vs. Glory...now & ever... [Refrain]

[The children will line up in the back of the church for the procession.]

SECOND ANTIPHON verses & refrain (Psalm 115/116)

Vs. I believed, therefore have I spoken: But I have been humbled exceedingly.

Refrain: O Son of God, Who sat on a colt, save us who sing to Thee, Alleluia.

- Vs. What shall I render to the Lord for all He has rendered to me? [Refrain]
- Vs. My vows will I pay unto the Lord, in the presence of His people. [Refrain]

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Only Begotten Son and immortal Word of God who for our salvation didst will to be incarnate of the holy Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary, who without change didst become man and wast crucified, O Christ our God, trampling down death by death, who art one of the Holy Trinity, glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit: save us!

THIRD ANTIPHON with Troparion Refrain – Psalm 117/118

Verse:

O give thanks unto the Lord for He is good: for His mercy endureth forever. Let the house of Israel now say that He is good: for His mercy endureth forever.

Refrain:

By raising <u>Lazarus</u> from the dead before Thy <u>passion</u>,
Thou didst confirm the universal resurrection, O <u>Christ God</u>.
Like the <u>children</u> with the palms of <u>victory</u>,
we cry out to Thee, O <u>Vanquisher of death</u>:
Hos<u>anna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the <u>name</u> of the Lord.</u>

Let the house of Aaron now say that He is good: for His mercy endureth forever. Let all that fear the Lord now say that He is good: for His mercy endureth forever.

Refrain: By raising Lazarus...

As the clergy walk in procession with the children, we sing the following festal hymns:

Troparion of Lazarus

By raising <u>Lazarus</u> from the dead before Thy <u>passion</u>,
Thou didst confirm the universal resurrection, O <u>Christ</u> God.
Like the <u>children</u> with the palms of <u>victory</u>,
we cry out to Thee, O <u>Vanquisher</u> of death:
Hos<u>anna</u> in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the <u>name</u> of the Lord.

Kontakion of Palm Sunday

Sitting on Thy throne in heaven; carried on a colt on earth, O Christ God, accept the praise of angels and the songs of children, who sing: Blessed is He Who comes to recall Adam.

As the children line up in two rows in the center aisle, we sing:

Troparion for Palm Sunday

O Christ God, when we were buried with Thee in Baptism, we became deserving of Thy Resurrection to Immortal Life. Wherefore we praise Thee, crying: Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the Name of the Lord.

The children place their palms on the floor.

Priest: For holy art Thou...

Deacon: and unto ages of ages.

People: Amen.

The clergy enter the altar.

Prokeimenon before the Epistle

Alleluia before the Gospel

THE GOSPEL READING John 12:1-18

Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus who had died was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at table with him. Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure nard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped His feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. But Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, one of His disciples [he who was to betray Jesus] said, "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" This he said, not because he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the moneybox he used to take what was put into it. Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of My burial. The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have Me."

When the great crowd of the Jews learned that He was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Lazarus, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazarus also to death, because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus.

The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, the King of Israel!" And Jesus found a young donkey and sat upon it; as it is written, "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your King is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!"

His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. The crowd that had been with Jesus when He called Lazarus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. The reason why the crowd went to meet Jesus was that they heard He had done this sign.

LITURGY OF THE FAITHFUL

Hymn to the Mother of God (Meglynarion)

God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us! Celebrate the Feast and come with gladness! Let us magnify Christ with palms and branches, singing: Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord.

Communion Hymn

Blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord. God is the Lord and hath revealed Himself to us.

Instead of "We have seen the true light..." we sing the Troparion for Lazarus

By raising Lazarus from the dead before Thy passion, Thou didst confirm the universal resurrection, O Christ God. Like the children with the palms of victory, we cry out to Thee, O Vanquisher of death: Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord.


HOLY COMMUNION

In the Orthodox Church, the sacrament of Communion is offered only to Christians who are baptized in the name of the Trinity and chrismated into the Orthodox Faith. Non-Orthodox believers may approach the chalice for a blessing and the blessed bread instead of the Eucharist. So that the priest is aware of this, please just say,

"Father, bless" when you get to the chalice.

Thanksgiving Prayers after Communion

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, we offer the prayers of thanksgiving for having received the Body and Blood of Christ. These beautiful prayers help us to reflect on the mystery in which we have just partaken, and prepare us for our transition back into the "world." We invite you to listen to these beautiful prayers during and after the veneration of the cross at the end of the service, and ask that you show courtesy to those who are remaining to hear the prayers in their entirety by waiting until Coffee Hour to socialize.

To Be Read from the Pulpit and Printed in the Bulletin

Beloved in Christ:

Blessings and greetings to you and your families on the day of this Great Feast!

Having completed the forty-day Fast, we take time before entering into Holy Week to celebrate the raising of Lazarus and our Lord's triumphant entry into the holy city of Jerusalem before His salvific passion and resurrection. Christ's raising of Lazarus is a prototype of our bodily resurrection, and His entry into Jerusalem confirms his kingship of humility and love, not egoism and the sword.

The historical settings of these two decisive events bring us back to the Middle East and our Mother Church. While we are hopeful that the terrible war that has plagued Syria for the past several years is coming to an end, its effects on the people both of Syria and Lebanon will be felt for generations. As they turn from this time of war and suffering to one of hope and rebuilding, we must continue to stand with our Father in Christ, Patriarch JOHN X, and the daunting task he faces. Let us help him to ensure that our Church will remain both a beacon of hope to the suffering and displaced and a leader in the efforts to rebuild and restore the brokenness of the people.

It's that time of year again!

PASCHA BREAK-FAST

This year immediately following the Divine Liturgy, we will be seated on our patio and enjoy our Pascha/Easter Baskets together. The church will provide a Pascha cheese table, and a beverage bar with coffee, hot chocolate, juice and chocolate milk.

We will have several tables for any potluck items that you choose to bring and share, especially with our visitors. Suggestions for potluck items are quiches, deviled eggs, crockpot hams, sausages, fruit and cheese platters or anything else you would like to bring.

So now is the time for your family or group of friends to start thinking about what you will put in your special basket! Suggestions are sliced meats, cheeses, fruit, eggs, chocolates, etc. Baskets will be set on tables at the front of the church on the left side, and will be blessed at the end of the Paschal Liturgy.

Our famous barbeque will happen in the afternoon!

PASCHA PICNIC

The main focus of our celebration this year will be the afternoon PICNIC at Kiwanis Meadows/Tuckers Grove at 3 p.m. We will barbeque tri-tip, salsa and bread will be provided. Please bring a large salad (green, potato, pasta, fruit) to share and your own place settings and beverages. As always, there will be games, activities for our children, plus music and lots of wonderful fellowship. Plan to attend this special day for our church family. It is a great opportunity to bring your non-Orthodox friends and family members, as well!

A BRIEF SUMMARY OF ORTHODOX HOLY WEEK

Every Sunday of the Ecclesiastical Year, being a "little Pascha", commemorates the glorious Resurrection of Christ, but each day of Holy Week has its own special character.



On **HOLY MONDAY** we remember Joseph, the son of Jacob, who was betrayed by his brothers and sold into slavery. After much suffering, there came triumph for him in Egypt. He is, thus, a prototype of Christ. To commemorate this, we celebrate the Bridegroom Service on Palm Sunday evening. The Gospel for the day tells about the barren fig tree, speaking of the world's failure to bear fruit in Christ.

HOLY TUESDAY presents the parable of the wise and foolish virgins. Preparing for the coming of Christ requires proper preparation and wakefulness, which are the foundations of vivid faith. We also hear the condemnation of the hypocritical Scribes and Pharisees.

HOLY WEDNESDAY presents the story of the woman who poured precious ointment on Jesus. Her action of love is in contrast to that of Judas who betrayed the Master. In the evening the Holy Mystery (Sacrament) of Holy Unction is celebrated.



HOLY THURSDAY depicts the Mystical (Last)
Supper of Christ with His Apostles, including the
washing of the feet of the Apostles, the betrayal of Judas, and the agony

in the Garden of Gethsemane.

HOLY FRIDAY is the day of the Passion, Crucifixion and death of Christ (celebrated Holy Thursday evening).

The morning service of the Royal Hours observes the hours of Christ on the Cross. In the afternoon, we view the removal of Christ from the

Cross, and His burial.



HOLY SATURDAY speaks of the entombment of Christ and His descent into Hell, the realm of the dead

(celebrated Holy Friday evening). It begins in mourning and lamentation, but ends with the glory that is to burst forth on the Great Day of the Resurrection.
