# THE GOSPEL READING for PENTECOST John 7:37-52, 8:12

On the last day of the feast, the great day, Jesus stood up and proclaimed, "If anyone thirst, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water." Now this He said about the Spirit, which those who believed in Him were to receive; for as yet the Spirit had not been given, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

When they heard these words, many of the people said, "This is really the prophet." Others said, "This is the Christ." But some said, "Is the Christ to come from Galilee? Has not the Scripture said that the Christ is descended from David, and comes from Bethlehem, the village where

David was?" So there was a division among the people over Him. Some of them wanted to arrest Him, but no one laid hands on Him.

The officers then went back to the chief priests and Pharisees, who said to them, "Why did you not bring Him?" The officers answered, "No man ever spoke like this man!" The Pharisees answered them, "Are you led astray, you also? Have any of the authorities or of the Pharisees believed in Him? But this crowd, who do not know the Law, are accursed." Nicodemus, who had gone to Him before, and who was one of them, said to them, "Does our Law judge a man without first giving him a hearing and learning what he does?" They replied, "Are you from Galilee too? Search and you will see that no prophet is to rise from Galilee."

Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world; he who follows Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

# HYMN TO THE MOTHER OF GOD (Meglynarion) 9<sup>th</sup> Ode of the Canon for Pentecost:

Rejoice, O Queen, glory of mothers and virgins! No tongue, however sweet or fluent, is eloquent enough to praise you worthily. Every mind is overawed by your childbearing. Therefore, with one voice, we glorify you.

## Instead of "We have seen the true light, we sing the Troparion for Pentecost.

At the end of the Liturgy, we will say the **Kneeling Prayers of Pentecost**. Between Pascha and Pentecost, the Church proscribes no kneeling during services as we celebrate the joy of the Resurrection for 40 days. With these prayers, we resume kneeling in the church. We also resume saying "O Heavenly King" in our daily prayers and in the Trisagion Prayers in our services.

#### **HOLY COMMUNION**

In the Orthodox Church, the sacrament of Communion is offered only to Christians who are baptized in the name of the Trinity and chrismated into the Orthodox Faith. Non-Orthodox believers **may approach the chalice for a blessing and the blessed bread instead of the Eucharist.** So that the priest is aware of this, please just say, "Father, bless" when you get to the chalice.

## **Thanksgiving Prayers after Communion**

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, we offer the prayers of thanksgiving for having received the Body and Blood of Christ. These beautiful prayers help us to reflect on the mystery in which we have just partaken, and prepare us for our transition back into the "world." We invite you to listen to these beautiful prayers during and after the veneration of the cross at the end of the service, and ask that you show courtesy to those who are remaining to hear the prayers in their entirety by waiting until Coffee Hour to socialize.

# NOMINATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED FROM NOW THROUGH MIDNIGHT ON JUNE 8th.

### NEW AREA CODE & CHANGE IN THE WAY THAT WE DIAL LOCAL CALLS

Beginning June 30, consumers requesting new or additional telephone numbers for services may be assigned telephone numbers with either the new 820 area code or the original 805 area code, depending on the available telephone number inventory. **As of June 2nd,** customers will have to dial "1" plus the three-digit area code for all calls from landline telephone numbers with the 805 and 820 area codes. If you do not, you will get a an error message. For cellphone calls, the area code needs to be used for those local numbers but dialing 1 is not necessary.

You will need to reprogram equipment or features that currently use 7-digit dialing, including automatic dialers, life safety systems and medical monitoring devices, speed-dialing, call forwarding, voicemail services, modems for computer or Internet dialup access, and other similar services or equipment. Residents and businesses also need to ensure that alarms and security systems are reprogrammed to include the area code. Despite the new area code overlay, consumers will still be able to dial three digits to reach 911, 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, 711, and 811.

On Pentecost, fifty days after His glorious resurrection, Jesus gave His friends the promised gift of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit—the treasury of good things and giver of life—brought life-giving gifts. These gifts were not just for Jesus' friends long ago. Jesus promises these gifts to all who ask. These gifts are for us!

- Wisdom: knowing the way that pleases God and walking in it
- **Understanding:** seeing clearly with spiritual eyes as a result of listening for God's voice with an open heart
- Counsel: helpful words and wise guidance for others
- **Might:** strength and courage to do what's right
- Knowledge: knowing more and more of God through prayer, God's Word and God's Creation
- **Fear of the Lord:** living without fear of anyone or anything except the Awesome, Holy, and Almighty God in whom we take refuge
- **Delight:** living in joy and wonder at the recognition of God's presence all around, all the time

## The Cross and Pentecost

The Cross and Pentecost are inseparable in Orthodoxy. The interdependent connection between these two events forms the foundation and provides the entire paradigm of Orthodox spirituality, liturgical life and theological reflection, most especially regarding our theology of asceticism and deification. It is only through this connection that we can understand the many antinomies and even paradoxes of the spiritual life.


How is the Cross seen as united to Pentecost? Is it not more logical to see the Cross united with the Resurrection? True, had Jesus' ministry simply ended with His death on the Cross, His message and His person would have been shrouded in ambiguity. The Resurrection clarified the Cross. Yet no one witnessed the Resurrection. Therefore, after His Resurrection, Jesus Himself began to appear to the disciples, revealing to them the true nature of His messianic office and the meaning of His sufferings and death. He did this by giving them all the empirical evidence of His Resurrection that they desired, by eating with them, letting Thomas touch His wounds, etc. Equally important, Christ "opened their minds" to understand the Scriptures and reasons for His sufferings. Before this, they did not fully understand these things. Thus, the Resurrection clarified the Cross.

However, even after all this, there was still no preaching, no apologetics, no baptism or sacraments, until the descent of the Holy Spirit. On the very day the Spirit was given, the Gospel was preached and Peter baptized 3,000 men. The disciples were given a power to explain the Cross and were henceforth led by the Holy Spirit in their ministry. In other words, the Resurrection and "its many infallible proofs" (Acts 1:3) were not enough — the Spirt was needed. Pentecost actualized the power of the Resurrection.
