EPISTLE READING 1 Corinthians 4:9-16

Brethren, God has exhibited us Apostles as last of all, like men sentenced to death; because we have become a spectacle to the world, to angels and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute. To the present hour we hunger and thirst, we are ill-clad and buffeted and homeless, and we labor, working with our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we try to conciliate; we have become, and are now, as the refuse of the world, the off-scouring of all things. I do not write this to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers. For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the Gospel. I urge you, then, be imitators of me.

GOSPEL READING John 1:35-51

At that time John was standing with two of his disciples; and he looked at Jesus as He walked, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. Jesus turned, and saw them following, and said to them, "What do you seek?" And they said to Him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where art Thou staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where He was staying; and they stayed with Him that day, for it was about the tenth hour. One of the two who heard John speak, and followed Him, was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon, and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him, and said, "So you are Simon the son of Jonah? You shall be called Cephas" (which means Peter). The next day, Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathaniel, and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and also the Prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Nathaniel said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming to Him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" Nathaniel said to Him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathaniel answered Him, "Rabbi, Thou art the Son of God! Thou art the King of Israel!" Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." And He said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

Communion Hymns

Holy Communion

In the Orthodox Church, the Sacrament of Communion is offered only to Orthodox Christians who have humbly prepared to receive through prayer, fasting, and a recent Sacramental Confession.

Non-Orthodox people and those not communing today may approach during Communion for a priestly blessing by saying, "Father, bless." After this you may take a piece of anti-doron (blessed bread) offered in the bowls.

PRAXIS

How we practice our Faith — Some Reminders

KISS OF PEACE

The Kiss of Peace has the specific purpose of expressing our unity of faith and love in Christ. When the priest proclaims, "Christ is in our midst," it is sufficient to simply offer the reply, "He is and ever shall be" with one voice as a congregation. It is best to remain in your place to exchange the Kiss of Peace with a few of those standing near you. Please do not go find others who are in other places, as this is not an appropriate time to find people to greet nor to chat. When the recitation of the Creed that proclaims our unity of faith begins, all exchanges should be complete. That is the time to focus more on our prayer, to say the Creed together and to pray the Anaphora during which the elements of bread and wine are transfigured into the body and blood of Jesus Christ. However, the Kiss of Peace is also about enacting reconciliation and forgiveness. It provides a necessary reminder and opportunity for reconciliation with our fellow Orthodox Christians before we commune. If you need to seek forgiveness and reconcile with someone standing elsewhere in the Nave, then please do so before Communion!

We are undergoing some changes in the big kitchen to comply with county health regulations, so food and floral items have to be handled in a very particular way, and not just set on one of the counter tops. We do periodic clothing collections for the Showers of Blessing when they request specific items. We will let our parishioners know when there is a need. Otherwise, it is best to donate used clothing to a thrift store or shelter.

HONORING OUR PARISH ELDERS

Maintaining Vim, Vigor, Verve And Vitality At Age 81! By David Samuel McCalmont (Born 12/3/1944)

Paraphrasing Isak Dinesen's iconic opening line from *Out of Africa*, "I lived a charmed childhood in an idyllic affluent neighborhood amidst the rolling hills south of Pittsburgh". Life can be likened to an ongoing book which can't be closed out until we die, letting only others to write the epilogue and apply the exclamation points. Meanwhile, along the way we gather "acknowledgements" (every book has those). Generally our successes can be attributed to others while our failures can usually be assigned to us ignoring or violating handed-down wisdom.

Leo Tolstoy began *Anna Karenina*, "All happy families are alike; each unhappy family is unhappy in its own way". Mine straddled the pivot-point between happy and unhappy - as good as it gets for a brokered marriage. Thomas Merton (*The Seven Storey Mountain*) spoke of the "four walls of my freedom" as he entered a monastery to eventually become Father Louis. My parents partnered in creating as loving an environment as Calvinism would permit without preaching or backbiting.



Independence, work ethic, rules, order, harmony, balance, symmetry. These are the keys, if not to the Kingdom, at least to happiness, joy and contentment here on earth. Mom created our moral universe; Dad enforced it. The main bloodless weapon keeping us in line was The Curfew. In before 11:30pm on weekends - no questions; arrive *anytime* after 11:30pm - 20 (or more) questions. Liberal democracy encourages expansion of rights. A wholesome Christian household establishes boundaries to acceptable behavior. Makes for happy, humble, respectful kids, and throughout life..

We honor our parents because they brought us into the world and sacrificed themselves to raise us. Respect? Parents earn that through action. Authority comes from a coefficient of performing duties and fulfilling responsibilities without fanfare. *The icing on the cake comes from being there for you - unjudgmentally - when life hits an earth-shaking pothole*. Children remember those moments *forever*. Washington, D.C., sometime in Fall 1971, 3:00am - "Dad, I need you - *now*". It was a workday for him. He *was there* by my side at 11:00am (275 miles in 8 hours). No tantrum or scolding in front of others. Can't say so much, though, for the ride home. I was 26.

On my mother's side were the boundaries of unspoken expectations. Don't even *think* about doing *anything* on Sunday except going to church. And we did - and liked it (so much so that last Sunday, all 3 McCalmont boys, in their 80s, were in church). Mom saw to it that a couple times each summer we attended church camp at Camp Fairfield (which became Antiochian Village in 1979). I fondly recall an elderly (to a 5th grader) camp director rousting us all out of bed at 6:30am with a version of Robert Browning's "God is in Heaven; all's right with the world". That vocal anthem over the years has given me spiritual comfort, hope and nurture to tide me over the rough times in my faith.

Speaking of "rough patch", it's a poorly held secret that things weren't going well for me from 2006 through 2019. Here is not the time to rehash details about that era, or place to call out the numerous saintly acts parish members performed to my benefit (if for no other reason than fear of leaving someone out). But there *is* one woman - she's no longer with St. Athanasius - who stands head and shoulders above the others because so many times *she was there when there meant the possible difference between life and death*. Many Years to her.

In summary, aging gracefully is a factor of gratitude, staying healthy and productive, and like playing chess - always looking ahead for life's next moves. Being and staying relevant in your circle of influence. Relentless curiosity; intense research - a shark dies if it's not moving forward. Become certain of yourself and unafraid of others' beliefs. Remember the harmony and interdependence between faith and works. Both are necessary for the pursuit of holiness and the "working out our salvation" (Philippians 2:12). Amen.
