

At the conclusion of Matins, we sing the Great Doxology followed by the Matins Dismissal Troparion.

THE DIVINE LITURGY OF ST. BASIL THE GREAT

During Great Lent, we will be singing music that may sound new or different than what we have been singing during the rest of the year, in order to signal a shift into this penitential season.



FIRST ANTIPHON—Psalm verses with refrain

• The Lord is King, and hath clothed Himself with majesty. The Lord is robed; He is girded with strength. For He has established the world so sure that it shall never be moved.

Refrain: Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us.

- Who can utter the mighty acts of the Lord? Who can cause all His praises to be heard? Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, whom He hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy. (*Refrain*)
- Glory... Both now... (*Refrain*)

SECOND ANTIPHON—Psalm verses with refrain

• Let them praise the Lord for His mercies, and for His wonderful works to the children of men.

Refrain: O Son of God, Who rose from the dead; save us who sing to Thee. Alleluia.

- Let them exalt Him in the congregation of the people, and praise Him in the seat of the elders. (*Refrain*)
- The eyes of the Lord are upon them that fear Him, upon them that hope in His mercy; to hear the groaning of the prisoners, to loose the sons of the slain. (*Refrain*)

Only begotten Son and immortal Word of God, who for our salvation didst will to be incarnate of the Holy Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary, who without change didst become man and was crucified, O Christ our God, trampling down death by death, who art one of the Holy Trinity, glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit: save us.

THIRD ANTIPHON

Verse: Let the heavens and the earth praise Him.

Refrain:

We <u>ven</u>erate Your most pure image, O <u>Good</u> One;

and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O <u>Christ</u> our God. Of Your own <u>will</u> You were pleased to ascend the <u>cross</u> in the flesh

to deliver Your creatures from bondage to the Enemy.

Therefore with thanksgiving we cry aloud to You:

"You have filled all with joy. O our Savior!"



Tone 1

While the stone was sealed by the Jews, and the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure body, Thou didst arise on the third day, O Savior, granting life to the world. For which cause the heavenly pow'rs cried aloud unto Thee, O Giver of life; Glory to Thy resurrection, O Christ! Glory to Thy kingdom! Glory to Thy providence, O Thou Who alone art the lover of mankind.

Troparion of First Sunday of Great Lent

Tone 2 Byzantine melody

We venerate Thy most pure image, O Good One; and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O Christ our God. Of Thy good will Thou wast pleased to ascend the cross in the flesh and deliver Thy creatures from bondage to the Enemy. Therefore with thankfulness we cry aloud to Thee: "Thou hast filled all with joy, O our Savior, for Thou didst come to save the world."

Troparion to St. Athanasius (Music on p. 54 of Liturgy book)

Tone 3 Byzantine melody harmonized by Fr. J. Finley

Holy Bishop Athanasius, you became a stronghold of Orthodoxy, strengthening the Church through your divine teachings.

Opposing the heretical opinion of Arius, you explained and taught that the Son is equal in nature with the Father.

O holy Father, intercede with Christ God that He may grant us abundant mercy.

Kontakion for the Triumph of Orthodoxy

Preparatory Psalm Verses before the Epistle (Prokeimenon)

Tone 8

Blessed are You, O Lord God of our Fathers, and praised and glorified is Your name forever.

Verse: For You are just in all that You have done for us.

EPISTLE READING Hebrews 11:24-26, 32-40

Brethren, by faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to share ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets. Who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, received promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Some were tor-

tured, refusing to accept release, that they might rise again to a better life. Others suffered mocking and scourging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were killed with the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, ill-treated -- of whom the world was not worthy -- wandering over deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, though well attested by their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had foreseen something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

LITURGY OF THE FAITHFUL

Meglynarion—Hymn to the Mother of God

All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace: the assembly of Angels and the race of men. O sanctified temple and spiritual paradise, the glory of virgins, from whom God was incarnate and became a Child – our God before the ages: He made your body into a throne, and your womb He made more spacious than the heavens. All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace. Glory to you!

COMMUNION HYMNS

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps 148:1) Rejoice in the Lord, O you righteous; praise befits the just! (Ps 32/33:1)

DURING GREAT LENT,

the children ages 4 and older are invited to come over to
the choir area during the Prayer Before Communion ("I believe, O Lord,
and I confess...") and sing the Communion Hymns with the choir.

Their parents or godparents should pick them up in the choir area after the
priest comes out with the chalice so that they can
get in line for Communion.

HOLY COMMUNION

In the Orthodox Church, the sacrament of Communion is offered only to Christians who are baptized in the name of the Trinity and chrismated into the Orthodox Faith. Non-Orthodox believers **may** approach the chalice for a blessing and the blessed bread instead of the Eucharist. So that the priest is aware of this, please just say,

"Father, bless" when you get to the chalice.

Thanksgiving Prayers after Communion

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, we offer the prayers of thanksgiving for having received the Body and Blood of Christ. These beautiful prayers help us to reflect on the mystery in which we have just partaken, and prepare us for our transition back into the "world." We invite you to listen to these beautiful prayers during and after the veneration of the cross at the end of the service, and ask that you show courtesy to those who are remaining to hear the prayers in their entirety by waiting until Coffee Hour to socialize.

Reverend Fathers, Esteemed Members of the Parish Council, and Beloved Faithful:

Greetings and blessings to you in the Name of Our Lord, God, and Savior, Jesus Christl

I pray that all of you have begun the long journey to Pascha with a rigorous and spiritually fruitful first week of the fast.

Today is a day both to celebrate and reflect. We reflect on a time in our history when the holy icons were removed due to false teaching, and we celebrate their restoral through the triumph of true theology. This historical triumph reminds us that the education of our future clergy is of the utmost importance, for they will be tasked in the coming years with teaching true theology and rejecting false teachings. Therefore, each year on this day, it is meet and right that we ask the faithful to contribute towards the education and formation of our young men studying for the holy priesthood.

On the Fragmentation of the Soul

Created with a single, simple, and undivided consciousness, the fall shattered the integrity of the self into two conflicting activities, one drawn to divine realities, and the other dragged outward into the surface appearances of the visible world through sense perception and subject to a process of ongoing fragmentation. Having promised us a technological utopia, our ubiquitous and intrusive cyber culture has instead precipitated a spiritual crisis in which human experience has been systematically fragmented and the coherence of the self increasingly threatened. Living in a culture of organized distractions, our thoughts are isolated and disconnected, preventing us from seeing and experiencing the wholeness of life. Distraction and fragmentation have negative consequences for the organization of knowledge, they prevent us from engaging our spiritual depth, and render us incapable of engaging the spiritual depth of others, for having lost touch with our own personhood, we can receive neither the personhood of our neighbor nor God.
