
THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE GREAT LITANY

FIRST ANTIPHON verses for the Feast of the Cross with refrain:

Vs. O God, my God, attend to me; why hast Thou forsaken me? Far from my salvation are the words of my transgressions.






- Vs. My God, I will cry by day, and wilt Thou not hearken? But as for Thee, Thou dwellest in the sanctuary, O Praise of Israel. [**Refrain**]
- Vs. Glory...now & ever...Amen. [Refrain]

SECOND ANTIPHON verses for the Feast of the Cross & refrain

Vs. O God, why hast Thou cast us off unto the end? Remember Thy congregation which Thou hast purchased from the beginning.

Refrain:



- Vs. This is Mount Zion wherein Thou hast dwelt. [Refrain]
- Vs. God is our King before the ages, He hath wrought salvation in the midst of the earth. [Refrain]

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Only Begotten Son and immortal Word of God who for our salvation didst will to be incarnate of the holy Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary, who without change didst become man and wast crucified, O Christ our God, trampling down death by death, who art one of the Holy Trinity, glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit: save us!

THIRD ANTIPHON verses for the feast of the Cross

Vs. The Lord is king, let the peoples rage; He sitteth on the Cherubim, let the earth be shaken.

Refrain: (For music, turn to next page.)

O Lord save Thy people and bless Thine inheritance, granting victory over all adversaries. And by the pow'r of Thy cross protect us.

- Vs. The Lord is great in Zion, and He is high above all peoples.
- Vs. Let them confess Thy great Name, for it is terrible and holy.

Troparion of the Cross

O Lord save Thy people and bless Thine inheritance, granting victory over all adversaries. And by the pow'r of Thy cross protect us.

Troparion for St. Eustathius and His Family

Your holy martyr Eustáthius and his wife and sons, O Lord, through their sufferings have received incorruptible crowns from You, our God. For having Your strength, they laid low their adversaries, and shattered the powerless boldness of demons.// Through their intercessions, save our souls!

Troparion to St. Athanasius

(Music on p. 54 of Liturgy book) Holy Bishop Athanasius, you became a stronghold of Orthodoxy, strengthening the Church through your divine teachings. Opposing the heretical opinion of Arius, you explained and taught that the Son is equal in nature with the Father. O holy Father, intercede with Christ God

that He may grant us abundant mercy.

Kontakion for the Feast of the Cross

As You were voluntarily raised upon the Cross for our sake, grant mercy to those who are called by Your Name, O Christ God; make all Orthodox Christians glad by your power, granting them victories over their adversaries// by bestowing on them the invincible trophy, Your weapon of peace!



EPISTLE READING Galatians. (2:16-20)

Brethren, you know that a man is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ. Even we have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ, and not by works of the law, because by works of the law shall no one be justified. But if, in our endeavor to be justified in Christ, we ourselves were found to be sinners, is Christ then an agent of sin? Certainly not! But if I build up again those things which I tore down, then I prove myself a transgressor. For I through the Law died to the Law, that I might live to God. I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ Who lives in me; and the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, Who loved me and gave Himself for me.

For whoever is ashamed of Me and of My words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of man also be ashamed, when He comes in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." And He said to them, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Kingdom of God come with power."

TODAY WE HONOR AND THANK OUR CHURCH MUSICIANS— All those who lead us in the music of our worship as choir members & chanters 52 weeks of the year!

At St. Athanasius, we are committed to beautiful, prayerful, engaging worship, and that means beautiful music. The mixed choir currently sings for all Sunday Liturgies, Feast Days, Vespers for feast days, and many of the services of Holy Week and Pascha. The choir rehearses 3-5 times per month. We also have a growing group of chanters who sing for Saturday Vespers, Sunday Matins, and other special weekday prayer services.

Choir members are expected to attend 75% of all services and rehearsals and to take their responsibilities as "Music Ministers" in the parish very seriously. This is a huge commitment of time, talent and energy, and to this dedicated group of volunteers we say:

THE MUSIC OF ORTHODOX WORSHIP

The foundation of Byzantine liturgy was built on the extensive singing of Psalm texts. The cantors would announce a psalm, its refrain, and then chant the verses, to which the assembly as liturgical respondents would then sing the common response. This ancient practice reveals several things about the character of Byzantine liturgical execution. For one, it underscores the continuing role of the assembly to listen and to respond as a unified body in a common dialogue of faith. (continued on the next page...)



The liturgical singers fulfill two primary roles as part of their ministerial offering:

1) to prepare and execute those textual and musical components which change from verse to verse, and furthermore from week to week, feast to feast, and season to season; and

2) to introduce, to lead, and to support the assembly in the singing of its own responses.

Based on liturgy itself, nothing fundamental regarding these key ceremonial ministries has changed since their initial formulations and designated purposes. In fact, the structure of the liturgy today often clearly maintains these models in its primary textual presentation, e.g. the litany still requires a response after each petition; the prokeimenon still offers a common refrain to be sung after each verse; the Anaphora still begins as a dialog, and so on.

St. Gregory of Sinai, speaking of music in the Church, said: "Psalmody has been given to us that we may rise from the sensory to the intellectual and true." Sacred music is uplifting, and there is a decided transforming power in it. It is grounded in matter—since all sounds proceed from vibrations of something material—yet the effect is uplifting beyond the sensory to a higher plane. And because music always requires the element of time, it is by nature an "event." It is dynamic rather than fixed, a flowing movement rather than a "still life." More than any other art, then, it carries the possibility of change, of transformation. In the case of genuinely spiritual music, it can elevate from the sensory to the sublime. St. John Chrysostom expressed it best: "Nothing uplifts the soul so much and gives it wings and liberates it from the earth and releases it from the fetters of the body and makes it aspire after wisdom and deride all the cares of this life, as the melody of unison and rhythm-possessing sacred songs."
