THE DIVINE LITURGY OF ST. BASIL THE GREAT

GREAT LITANY

First Antiphon verses with refrain:

The light of Thy countenance is marked upon us. Thou hast given a sign to them that fear Thee, so that they may flee from the bow.

Refrain: Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, Savior, save us.

Thou hast ascended on high, Thou hast led captivity captive. Thou hast given an inheritance to those that fear Thy Name, O Lord. (*Refrain*)

Glory... Both now... (Refrain)

Second Antiphon verses & refrain

All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God. Let us worship at the place where His feet stood.

Refrain: O Son of God, Who rose from the dead; save us who sing to Thee. Alleluia.

EPISTLE READING— Hebrews 4:14-5:6

Brethren, since we have a high priest, who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. For we have not a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. Because of this he is bound to offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not take the honor upon himself, but he is called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not exalt Himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by Him who said to Him, "You art my Son, today I have begotten You;" as He says also in another place, "You art a priest forever, after the order of Melchizedek."

GOSPEL READING—Mark 8:34-9:1

The Lord said, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. For what does it profit a man, to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul? For what can a man give in return for his soul? For whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of man also be ashamed, when he comes in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." And Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the kingdom of God come with power."

Meglynarion for Liturgy of St. Basil (Hymn to the Mother of God)

All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace: the assembly of Angels and the race of men. O sanctified temple and spiritual paradise, the glory of virgins, from whom God was incarnate and became a Child – our God before the ages: He made your body into a throne, and your womb He made more spacious than the heavens. All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace. Glory to you!

Communion Hymns

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (*Ps 148:1*) The light of Thy countenance has shone on us, O Lord. (*Ps 4/5:6*)

HOLY COMMUNION

In the Orthodox Church, the sacrament of Communion is offered only to Christians who are baptized in the name of the Trinity and chrismated into the Orthodox Faith. Non-Orthodox believers are invited to approach the chalice for a blessing and the blessed bread instead of the Eucharist.

So that the priest is aware of this, please just say,

"Father, bless" when you get to the chalice.

Thanksgiving Prayers after Communion

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, we offer the prayers of thanksgiving for having received the Body and Blood of Christ. These beautiful prayers help us to reflect on the mystery in which we have just partaken, and prepare us for our transition back into the "world." We invite you to listen to these beautiful prayers during and after the veneration of the cross at the end of the service, and ask that you show courtesy to those who are remaining to hear the prayers in their entirety by waiting until Coffee Hour to socialize.

WE EACH HAVE AN IMPORTANT ROLE TO PLAY Valerie Yova, Music Director

At its most engaging and energized, the Divine Liturgy is a lively dialogue between the clergy, the chanters/choir, and the assembly. (The "assembly" referring to those who stand in the center of the church between the clergy and the musicians.) It is a 3-pronged or 3-voiced dialogue of sorts.

Each of the three groups has an important role to play in the dialogue. At its best, the dialogue of liturgical prayer is done in good order, with humility and beauty.

It is true that we can observe MANY different ways of carrying out our liturgical worship within the Orthodox Church as we travel from parish to parish. We can look to the text of the Liturgy itself for the clues as to how to serve and sing it. And we look to the traditions that honor what the Liturgy itself has always implied about how we can ENGAGE in it with enthusiasm and love. Certain parts of our services seem to demand an active, verbal response from all of us. Other parts, like the priest's audible prayers, require our attention as listeners.

Each parish has its own unique "personality" in worship that should have the opportunity to emerge and to flower. Some parishes, like ours, simply LOVE to sing, and are more inclined to participate vocally in the worship. This is a wonderful thing.! I try to choose music that I think you will love singing or hearing. I try to be very careful and thoughtful about introducing new music. Often, if the choir is introducing something new, I give you the musical notation because many of you read music and have some musical training. I provide the music because I WANT you to sing.

In Hagia Sophia, the great church and center for Christian worship in the Byzantine empire, the cantors sang from a raised platform located near the center of the church. This prominent position allowed them to lead that assembly with audible and visible clarity. From this, we learn that very early in the life of the Church, musical LEADERSHIP was important for maintaining order and beauty in the services. We cannot lead from the middle of the church anymore, but it is important that the assembly be able to see and hear the musicians.

The size and acoustics of worship space do have an impact on the worship. I think we could all agree that things felt more intimate in our church in Isla Vista, and even at our interim building on Calle Real. Our beautiful, new, temporary worship space here on Sumida Gardens Lane (until we build the temple) presents some challenges to hearing the clergy, the choir, and each other. So to keep everything together and in "good order," we all need to be attentive to each other.

By all means, we are invited to sing and to do so with enthusiasm. **Most especially** in those parts of the liturgical dialogue when the clergy are directly addressing the entire assembly, like the litanies and the Anaphora. ("Let us pray to the Lord," to which we ALL respond, "Lord have mercy." Or, "Let US lift up OUR hearts," to which we ALL respond, "We lift them up unto the Lord.") As we sing, we do so with a greater sense of unity when we are attentive to the leadership being provided by the musicians, who give many hours of rehearsal and preparation to be able to lead you beautifully and with strength.

There are other parts of the services that change every week (for the saints of the day) and are rehearsed by the choir or chanters. These are more traditionally rendered by the musicians and listened to by the assembly. Actively listening can be as engaging as singing along, as we let the beautiful words of our hymns wash over our souls like soothing balm. If you know the hymns for special feasts and other favorite liturgical hymns, as many of you do, by all means, sing along, following the leadership provided by the choir.

PASCHA BREAK-FAST

This year immediately following the Divine Liturgy, we will be seated on our patio and enjoy our Pascha/Easter Baskets together. The church will provide a beautiful array of yeast sweet breads and Pascha cheese, and a beverage bar of coffee, juice and chocolate milk.

We will have several tables for any potluck items that you would like to bring and share, especially with our visitors. Keep in mind that we do not have a multitude of outlets in the small kitchen to plug in crock pots.

So now is the time for your family or group of friends to start thinking about what you will put in your special basket! Suggestions are sliced meats, cheeses, fruit, eggs, chocolates, etc. Baskets will be set on tables at the front of the church on the left side, and will be blessed at the end of the Paschal Liturgy.
