Brethren, I would have you know that the Gospel, which was preached by me, is not man's gospel. For I did not receive it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ. For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the Church of God violently and tried to destroy it; and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people; so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. But when He who had set me apart before I was born, and had called me through His grace, was pleased to reveal His Son to me, in order that I might preach Him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with flesh and blood, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned to Damascus. GOSPEL READING

And he rose and took the Child and His mother by night, and departed to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt have I called My Son." Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region, who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they were no more." But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saying, "Rise, take the Child and His mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the Child's life are dead." And he rose and took the Child and His mother, and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus reigned over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee. And he went and dwelt in a city called Nazareth, that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled, "He shall be called a Nazarene."

Holy Communion

In the Orthodox Church, the Sacrament of Communion is offered only to Orthodox Christians who have humbly prepared to receive through prayer, fasting, and a recent Sacramental Confession.

Non-Orthodox people and those not communing today may approach during Communion for a priestly blessing by saying, "Father, bless." After this you may take a piece of antidoron (blessed bread) offered in the bowls.

If you are interested in joining the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church, speak with our Pastor about how to become an Orthodox Christian.

PRAXIS

How we practice our Faith — Some Reminders

The Sacred Space of the Nave is set apart and we enter it as ones set apart.

When we are preparing to come to Church, we should put in the effort to honor God with our appearance and with our actions. What we wear influences our own attitude and the attention of others. Out of Christian charity we need to pay attention to this.

The Temple is not a place you should treat like any other. When you enter, pay attention to how you enter, how you act, what you speak, and even what you wear in this space. It is the house of God you are entering; it is the place where God comes to give Himself to you and where we gather to experience Him with all our senses; it is a place where we most especially strive to give Him all our focus. So let us help one another to give undivided attention to the Lord.

Reserve conversation that is merely social or political for outside the church, and limit even spiritual conversation for outside of the services. When you enter, know that you come before the Throne of God and the place of the sacrificial offering. Cease speaking of things of the world and reserve your speech for the holy words of the services, at the appropriate times. Let us pay a little more attention for the sake of the love of God and neighbor to enter with this kind of attentiveness. Let us reserve it as the most special place that it is.

Our God invites us to His Heavenly Banquet, and we should come acknowledging this fearsome honor in our appearance. However, He does not desire finery, but He desires our attention in prayer and worship and loves when we aid others in giving their attention to Him; this is what the Church calls modesty (Mt 22:1-14, 25:1-13; Is 61:10; I Pt 3:3-4; I Tim 2:8-10; Rev 16:15, 19:8). So, we should come dressed with honorable modesty as men and women, boys and girls, not drawing attention to ourselves, and in doing so helping others give attentive prayers to God.

JAMES IGETEI

SAMP PRIEST SERVING IN NIGERIA

Fr. James Igetei was born on November 12, 1980 into an Orthodox family. He was ordained to the priesthood in 2014. He currently serves two parishes, St. Luke in Benin City and St. Irene in Port-Harcourt.

The establishment of an indigenous Orthodox Church in west central Africa is a recent phenomenon of the last four decades. Greeks, Bulgarians, Russians, and Ethiopians lived throughout Nigeria, but had not established an outreach to the Nigerian people. A Nigerian Calvary Grace Church comprised of many congregations began corresponding with, and then joined, a non-canonical "orthodox catholic" church in the United States. During this time, a Nigerian chief, Dr. Illikannu, was searching for the original Church and, in doing so, began corresponding with the Patriarchate of Alexandria. Dr. Illikannu was instrumental in uniting the splinter groups by 1983 with the desire of joining the original, historical Orthodox Church.

The years between 1985 and 1992 were rocky years for the new Orthodox churches, yet it was during this time that men's and women's groups and youth groups were being formed, and the communities were growing. By the beginning of 1988, the Orthodox in Nigeria had 12 priests and 6 deacons, with 12 parishes and numerous mission stations.

In 1997, a new diocese of Nigeria was established by the holy Patriarchal Synod, and His Eminence ALEXANDER was appointed the first bishop. Two years later, in May 1999, the diocese opened the St. Anthony School in Lagos, a small seminary for the education of catechists and candidates for the priesthood. In 2004, the diocese was expanded to become an archdiocese. His Eminence fell asleep in the Lord in 2023. In February 2024, His Eminence NIKODIMOS was elected the new Metropolitan of Nigeria. His Eminence grew up in Germany and has served the Patriarchate of Alexandria since 2015, including 4 years in South Africa.

HONORING OUR PARISH ELDERS

HAPPY 91st BIRTHDAY AND MANY YEARS to Jerry Jones!

Jerry Jones was born in Missouri on December 26, 1934. Before the onset of WWII, his family moved across the Mississippi River and settled in Quincy, Illinois, where Jerry attended high school and graduated in 1952. He then began his academic training at Wheaton College. Jerry and his wife, Judy, married young, and he served in the Army in Germany after they were married.



He earned several academic degrees in the 1960s and pursued a PhD in Communications at Kent State University in the early 1970s. He eventually taught Communications at a small Bible college (Northwestern State) in Minnesota.

The Joneses moved to the North Country of Minnesota in the 1970s with their only child, Rick, and this was their home until Judy died in 2014. Jerry came to Santa Barbara in 2016 to be near his son and daughter-in-law, who were both Westmont College graduates and never left the South Coast.

In the early 1990s, the Holy Spirit moved Jerry to inquire into Eastern Orthodox Christianity and he was chrismated in 1995 in a parish in Minneapolis. He's been attached to St. Athanasius parish since coming here in 2016.

Jerry lives at Friendship Manor in Isla Vista, very near to where our original St. Athanasius Church building was. He served for several years as a faithful volunteer for our Showers of Blessing hospitality team on Thursday mornings. Jerry has been a faithful attendee of the liturgical services in our parish from the day he arrived here.
