

GREAT LITANY (FOR ADVENT)



FIRST ANTIPHON—Psalm verses with refrain

Vs. It is good to give praise unto the Lord, and to chant unto Thy name, O Most High; To proclaim Thy mercy in the morning, and Thy truth by night. [Refrain]

Refrain: Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us.

- Vs. Upright is the Lord our God, and there is no unrighteousness in Him. [Refrain]
- Vs. Glory...now & ever...Amen. [Refrain]

SECOND ANTIPHON—Psalm verses with refrain

Vs. The Lord is King, He is clothed with majesty; the Lord is clothed with strength and hath girded Himself.

Refrain: O Son Of God Who rose from the dead, save us who sing to Thee, Alleluia!

- Vs. For He hath established the world which shall not be shaken. [Refrain]
- Vs. Holiness befits Thy house, O Lord, forevermore. [Refrain]

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.



EPISTLE READING—1 Corinthians 4:9-16

Brethren, God has exhibited us Apostles as last of all, like men sentenced to death; because we have become a spectacle to the world, to angels and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute. To the present hour we hunger and thirst, we are ill-clad and buffeted and homeless, and we labor, working with our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when perse-

cuted, we endure; when slandered, we try to conciliate; we have become, and are now, as the refuse of the world, the offscouring of all things.

I do not write this to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers. For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel. I urge you, then, be imitators of me.

GOSPEL READING— John 1:35-51 "The Calling of Andrew"

At that time John was standing with two of his disciples; and he looked at Jesus as He walked, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. Jesus turned, and saw them following, and said to them, "What do you seek?" And they said to Him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are You staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where He was staying; and they stayed with Him that day, for it was about the tenth hour. One of the two who heard John speak, and followed Him, was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon, and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him, and said, "So you are Simon the son of Jonah? You shall be called Cephas" (which means Peter).

The next day, Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael, and said to him, "We have found Him of whom Moses in the Law and also the Prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming to Him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" Nathanael said to Him, "How do You know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathanael answered Him, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you

under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." And He said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

LITURGY OF THE FAITHFUL

Meglynarion—Hymn to the Mother of God

CHURCH ETIQUETTE CORNER Participation in the Divine Liturgy

The Divine Liturgy begins with the priest quietly praying for the Holy Spirit to be present and then he proclaims, "Blessed is the Kingdom of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit..." We should make every effort to be present for this moment, to join with each other and with the saints and angels, inaugurating our participation in that heavenly worship of the Holy Trinity at the glorious throne of God with our first resounding "Amen!"

If, however, you do arrive late, try to enter quietly, being sensitive to what is happening in the service. If you enter during the Epistle, Gospel, Homily, or the processions of the Little or Great Entrance, please wait until the liturgical action is completed to take a seat.

During the Liturgy, make an effort to remain throughout the entire service. Perhaps use the restroom and freshen up before entering so that, all together, we can praise and honor God.

The worship of the Church is a therapeutic method by which we come to our senses and find life, healing, and the rediscovery of our true identity. It is our time to stop and come together for this purpose — and to give thanks to our God who grants forgiveness of sins and immortal life!

Bible Study: The Book of Revelation (Apocalypse)

No book of the Bible has captured the imagination more than the book of Revelation, also known as the Apocalypse. The imagery and symbolism of the last book of the Bible has made common knowledge many words used in today's time: Armageddon, Antichrist, Babylon, the Beast, the Dragon, 666, and the New Jerusalem. We also hear that the prophecies of this book are coming true today, and that we can expect anytime the Rapture and the End of Days.

But what if our understanding of this is all wrong? What if pop culture and Hollywood have created an understanding of the Book of Revelation that has nothing to do with the vision Saint John had on the island of Patmos? What does the Book of Revelation actually say?

Saint John, the writer of the Gospel of the same name, was imprisoned on the island of Patmos for his Christian beliefs. He received a revelation one Sunday, and was commanded to "write in a book what you see" (Revelation 1:10). This vision is what we will study on the 3rd Tuesday of every month at 6:30 pm. The early Church understood the important message found in the words of the book of Revelation. Unfortunately, due shady theology from previous centuries, and attempts at entertainment in modern times, that message has been lost. Join us, as we rediscover the Book of Revelation!
