#### **HOLY COMMUNION**

In the Orthodox Church, the sacrament of Communion is offered only to Orthodox Christians who have prepared to receive. Non-Orthodox believers and others **may approach the chalice for a blessing and the blessed bread instead of the Eucharist.** So that the priest is aware of this, please just say, "Father, bless" when you get to the chalice.

## At the conclusion of Matins, we sing the Great Doxology followed by the PROCESSION WITH THE CROSS.

## THE DIVINE LITURGY OF ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

#### THE GREAT LITANY

#### First Antiphon verses with refrain:

The light of Thy countenance is marked upon us. Thou hast given a sign to them that fear Thee, so that they may flee from the bow.

#### Refrain: Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, Savior, save us.

Thou hast ascended on high, Thou hast led captivity captive. Thou hast given an inheritance to those that fear Thy Name, O Lord. (*Refrain*)

Glory... Both now... (Refrain)

#### **Second Antiphon verses & refrain**

All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God. Let us worship at the place where His feet stood.

## Refrain: O Son of God, Who rose from the dead; save us who sing to Thee. Alleluia.

God, our King before the ages, hath wrought salvation in the midst of the earth. (Refrain)

I will be exalted among the heathen; I will be exalted in the earth. (Refrain)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

**Only Begotten Son** and immortal Word of God who for our salvation didst will to be incarnate of the holy Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary, who without change didst become man and wast crucified, O Christ our God, trampling down death by death, who art one of the Holy Trinity, glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit: save us!

## Troparion of the Resurrection (Music on p. 51 of Liturgy book)

Tone 7

Thou didst shatter death by Thy Cross; Thou didst open paradise to the thief; Thou didst turn the sadness of the ointment bearing women into joy, and didst bid Thine apostles proclaim a warning that Thou hast risen, O Christ, granting the world the great mercy.

#### **Troparion of the Cross**

Tone 1

O <u>Lord</u> save Thy people, and bless Thine in<u>her</u>itance, <u>Grant</u> victory to all Orthodox Christians Over their <u>adversaries</u>. And by <u>virtue</u> of Thy Cross, Preserve Thy habitation.

#### **Troparion to St. Athanasius**

Holy Bishop Athanasius, you became a stronghold of Orthodoxy, strengthening the Church through your divine teachings. #### **EPISTLE READING— Hebrews 4:14-5:6**

Brethren, since we have a high priest, who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. For we have not a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need. For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. Because of this he is bound to offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not take the honor upon himself, but he is called by God, just as Aaron was. So also Christ did not exalt Himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by Him who said to Him, "You art my Son, today I have begotten You;" as He says also in another place, "You art a priest forever, after the order of Melchizedek."

#### **GOSPEL READING—Mark 8:34-9:1**

The Lord said, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. For what does it profit a man, to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul? For what can a man give in return for his soul? For whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of man also be ashamed, when he comes in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." And Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the kingdom of God come with power."

#### MEGLYNARION—HYMN TO THE MOTHER OF GOD

All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace: the assembly of Angels and the race of men. O sanctified temple and spiritual paradise, the glory of virgins, from whom God was incarnate and became a Child – our God before the ages: He made your body into a throne, and your womb He made more spacious than the heavens. All of creation rejoices in you, O Full of Grace. Glory to you!

### **Thanksgiving Prayers after Communion**

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, we offer the prayers of thanksgiving for having received the Body and Blood of Christ. These beautiful prayers help us to reflect on the mystery in which we have just partaken, and prepare us for our transition back into the "world." We invite you to listen to these beautiful prayers during and after the veneration of the cross at the end of the service, and <u>ask that you show courtesy to those who are remaining to hear the prayers in their entirety by waiting until the blessing of the food at Coffee Hour to eat and socialize.</u>

### A message from Fr. Symeon...

#### **Note about Communion:**

If you are going to partake of the precious body and blood of Jesus Christ, please stand in line with your arms crossed right over left on your chest and when you are about to partake say, "The servant of God..." and your baptismal name. The safest way to partake of Holy Communion is for the communicant to close their mouth fully on the spoon. This avoids nearly all possibility of accidents. However, if you prefer not to partake in this way, open your mouth wide and tilt your head back and the priest will turn over the spoon in your mouth to give you Communion.

### **Making a Lenten Confession:**

The Church teaches us to ready ourselves for Pascha by making a confession during Great Lent and to do so before Holy Unction on Holy Wednesday evening. Use the *ascesis* and time of Lent to prepare yourself to make a confession. Please contact Fr. Symeon, Fr. Nicholas, Fr. John Carrillo, or Fr. John Finley to schedule a time to make your lenten confession.

Please note that the opportunity for confession during Matins on Sunday will be limited, a priest may or may not be available, and needs to return to the Altar by the Great Doxology. Regular confession availability will be kept after Great Vespers on Saturdays, however, all other confessions should be made by appointment.

#### ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Men's Fellowship of St. John will not meet this Saturday due to Soul Liturgy. We will resume in May.

There will be NO PRESANCTIFIED LITURGY on Wednesday, April 13th (the 6th week of Lent). We are invited to join St. Barbara Greek parish for Presanctified Liturgy that evening. A meal will be provided afterwards, and Fr. Symeon will offer a brief meditation.

International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) is responding to the Ukrainian crisis by working with partners in Ukraine and across the region to address immediate needs while also looking ahead and planning for longer-term response. They have deployed staff to the area and are working with local churches to provide emergency supplies and food. ## The Third Sunday of Great Lent The Sunday of the Cross

"On this the Third Sunday of Great Lent, we observe the Veneration of the Precious and Lifegiving Cross and for this reason: Inasmuch as in the forty days of fasting we in a way crucify ourselves and become bitter, despondent and failing, the Life-giving Cross is presented to us for spiritual refreshment and assurance, for remembrance of our Lord's Passion and for comfort.

Like those who are following a long and tedious path are tired, see a beautiful tree with many leaves, they would sit in its shade and rest for a while and then, as if rejuvenated, they will continue their journey. Likewise today, in the time of fasting and difficult journey and effort, the Life-giving Cross was planted in its midst by the Holy Fathers of the Church to give rest and spiritual refreshment, to make us light and courageous for the remaining task.

Christ comforts us who are, as it were, in a desert until He will lead us up to the spiritual Jerusalem by His Resurrection. Just as the Precious Cross, which is also called the Tree of Life, was planted in the middle of Paradise, so our Holy Fathers planted the Cross in the middle of holy and Great Lent, as a sacred reminder of both Adam's bliss and how he was deprived of it. Remembering also that by partaking of this Tree of Life, the Precious and Life-giving Cross, we no longer die but are kept alive." (Synaxarion)
